Pastor's Corner

On November 6th, for the 57th since the founding, Americans go to the polls to elect a President. The first presidential election was held in 1788 - thirty eight years after our church was established. Our earliest congregants were patriots: twenty three Revolutionary War soldiers are buried in our cemetery.

Faith lies at the heart of the American experiment. The founding fathers affirmed God as the source of liberty; the one who endows every individual with unalienable rights to live securely, to act freely, and to pursue happiness. These rights do not come from government - they are the gifts of God's creative love.

Two hundred and twenty four years after that first national election, many issues confronting Americans need to hard work: taxation, jobs, the national debt, energy and terrorism among them. But some issues are so fundamental that they define who we are as a people, and who we will become.

Abortion continues to be a national scandal. The United States has the highest abortion rate in the western world, and the third-highest abortion rate of all developed nations worldwide. From a moral perspective, Abortion is the taking of innocent human life! People of faith must affirm and protect life from the moment of conception to the moment of natural death. It is, after all, God alone who gives life, and He alone has the right to calls it back to himself.

Marriage is under assault. For the first time in history, marriage is being re-defined. Marriage has always meant more than just two people in a committed, loving union. It is the love of a man and woman through which new life is created and nurtured in an family environment characterized by generative care. At a time when there is so much pressure on families, marriage doesn't need to be redefined, it needs to be reinforced!

Last year the U.S. Military issued a regulation prohibiting the giving or using religious items (including Bibles) during visits to the wounded in military hospitals. Since rescinded, this attempt to abridge religious freedom is chilling. More recently the federal government is trying to force the Catholic Church to fund birth control and abortion for church employees. As Cardinal Dolan said, "When the government tampers with a freedom so fundamental, one shudders to think what lies ahead."

Enduring principles are at stake this November: the sanctity of life, the sacredness of marriage, and respect for our basic religious freedom. Will we have the courage to vote for the values that lie at the heart of our Christian faith; values our fore bearers risked all to create and defend? "Unless the Lord builds, the house, they labor in vain who build it" (Psalm 127:1).

Growing up with devoted Christian parents, George Beverly Shea used his fine singing voice in church services where his father was a pastor. Financial needs of the family made it necessary for him to leave college and get a job, however he continued singing in church and for Christian radio programs. He was unexpectedly offered an audition in NYC and passed the test. The opportunity for a substantial salary and fame made the decision difficult. Mrs. Miller's poem was left on the family piano by George's mother for him to find when he was preparing for a church service. He was deeply moved by the challenge of this text and immediately composed the melody that he is famous for singing through the years especially for Billy Graham crusades.
