Let me tell you their story. Homer and Langley were the sons of a respected New York doctor at the turn of 20th century. Both men had earned college degrees and Homer had become a lawyer. When their father died, the boys inherited the family home and a sizable estate. Both men - confirmed bachelors - were now financially secure.

That is when their lifestyle took a turn for the bizarre. Rather than using their wealth to enjoy life, they retreated from it. They boarded up the windows of house and padlocked the doors. They had all the utilities shut off. Moreover, no one was ever seen coming and going from the house. Although their family had been quite prominent in society circles, by the time World War II had ended people had forgotten all about the crazy Collyer boys.

That was until March 21, 1947; when police received an anonymous tip that a man had died in the old Collyer house. Unable to force their way in the front door, the police had to climb through a second story window. Inside they found Homer Collyer dead in bed clutching the Feb. 22, 1920 issue of the Jewish Morning Journal. This was very strange since Homer had been totally blind for many years. Yet this macabre scene was set against an even more bizarre backdrop.

For it seemed that the brothers had been collectors of sorts. They collected everything - especially junk. Their house was crammed full of broken machinery, auto parts, boxes, appliances, folding chairs, musical instruments, rags, assorted odds and ends, and bundles of old newspapers. An enormous mountain of trash blocked the front door so the police were forced to use the second story window for weeks while the debris was cleared away.

Nearly three weeks later, as workers were still hauling away heaps of garbage, someone made a grisly discovery. Langley's body was discovered buried under a pile of rubbish some six feet away from where his brother had died. Apparently Langley was crushed to death in a crude booby trap he had built to protect his precious collection. The garbage eventually removed from the Collyer house totaled more than 140 tons. No one ever learned why the brothers were stockpiling their pitiful treasure....

Therein lies the spiritual lesson for us. All of us throughout our days accumulate trash in our lives. For some it may be a petty sin they cannot release; or a grudge we continue to nurse; a touch of foolish pride that clouds their vision or an unforgiving spirit hardens their heart. These things get in the way - like roadblocks on the road to heaven. Others have collected over the years, fads, feelings and philosophies that scratch their itchy ears - they have allowed every-thing that comes down the pike a place in their spiritual storage places. Some have stuffed their ears with so many worthless things that they are unable to hear the new and have no place for a fresh experience of God. Still others have allowed the world to gain a foothold in their lives and find that it has tried to take over. The pursuit of money, power or prestige has swallowed up large portions of their hearts. Moreover, as the years go by these ideas, attitudes and patterns begin to encrust our hearts, becoming entrenched so deeply that we would rather be crushed under their weight than let God change us. We become spiritual Langley Collyers suffocated by spiritual trash.

Let each of us examine ourselves to see what things clutter a fresh awareness of God. What in our lives keeps us from letting God work in and through us? The Lenten season is a good time for a little "spiritual spring-cleaning." A time to let Jesus come in and take out the trash from our hearts, our minds and our souls.

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
