Be on your guard; stand firm in the faith; be courageous; be strong.
(1 Corinthians 16:13)

The real Santa/Saint Nicholas was a bishop in Myra (Turkey) during the waning years of the Roman Empire. He was revered for his generosity and courage. The former exhibited in his supplying of gold in the stockings of young maidens looking to get married; the latter arising from his endurance under Roman torture for holding fast to the faith.

There is another story, more of a legend, that has fascinated me for a number of years. I was first drawn to this historical anecdote from an article from a writer for <u>World Magazine</u>, Gene Veith a number of years ago. He writes:

"He was also a delegate to the Council of Nicaea in a.d. 325, which battled the heretics who denied the deity of Christ. He was thus one of the authors of the Nicene Creed, which affirms that Jesus Christ is both true God and true man. And unlike his later manifestation, Nicholas was particularly zealous in standing up for Christ. During the Council of Nicaea, jolly old St. Nicholas got so fed up with Arius, who taught that Jesus was just a man, that he walked up and slapped him! That unbishoplike behavior got him in trouble. The council almost stripped him of his office, but Nicholas said he was sorry, so he was forgiven."



That scene certainly doesn't show up in any Christmas specials that I have even seen! The modern-day St. Nicholas/Santa Claus is far too humble and kind for such outbursts. Now as I said this is more legend than history, but the Greek Orthodox Church celebrates his life, ministry and slap on December 6th of each year.

Later in that same article, Veith goes on to write this:

"The point is, the original Santa Claus was someone who flew off the handle when he heard someone minimizing Christ. Perhaps we can battle our culture's increasingly Christ-less Christmas by enlisting Santa in his original cause. The poor girls' stockings have become part of our Christmas imagery. So should the St. Nicholas slap. Not a violent hit of the kind that got the good bishop in trouble, just a gentle, admonitory tap on the cheek. This should be reserved not for out-and-out nonbelievers, but for heretics (that is, people in the church who deny its teachings), Christians who forget about Jesus, and people who try to take Christ out of Christmas."

Now we should never condone violence, especially at this most wonderful time of the year, but the story of the Santa Slap can encourage us to be willing to stand up for the Gospel. To be willing to defend the truth of the baby born in Bethlehem. Born both true God and true man.

Unlike the secular calendar year, the church year does not begin on January. It begins four Sundays before Christmas Day with the season of Advent. The word "advent" means "coming" or "arrival." The focus of the entire time of Advent is on the three comings of Christ: remembrance of the birth of Jesus the Christ in the first advent, celebration of the second advent of God's Spirit given to believers, and anticipation of the third advent of the return of Christ as king.

Advent is a time of expectation, preparation, and longing. We wait, watch, and prepare for the coming of Christ Jesus into our lives. While the secular calendar places Christmas at the end of the year, it is fitting that as followers of Christ we begin our church year in anticipation of the nativity of our Savior, whose birth reminds us that "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God" (John 1:1).
