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From Craig's Desk

So What Are You Reading This Summer?

"Now that I am sixty, I see why the idea of elder wisdom has passed from currency." Author John Updike said that and, in saying that, caught my attention, which is itself sixty years old and limited.

John Updike, who died earlier this year, is one of our nation's best-known storytellers and poets. He is probably known best for his Rabbit series: *Rabbit, Run; Rabbit Redux; Rabbit Is Rich; Rabbit at Rest* and *Rabbit Remembered*. Both *Rabbit Is Rich* and *Rabbit At Rest* won the Pulitzer Prize.

An interesting thing about Updike is his long life of Christian worship. The grandson of a Presbyterian minister, he was raised a Lutheran, joined a Congregational church with his first wife who was herself the daughter of a Unitarian minister, and ended up an Episcopalian. Speaking to a group at a Manhattan church this past November, just a few months before he died, he said, "When I haven't been to church in a couple of Sundays I begin to hunger for it and need to be there. It's not just the words, the sacraments. It's the company of other people, who show up and pledge themselves to an invisible entity."

I know what he means. I really do. You may think that the pastor's job is to help build your faith, but it works the other way, too, and you ought to know that it does. I look forward to worship on Sunday mornings because of all of you who "show up and pledge yourselves . . ." Your witness lifts me.

Just for fun, I've listed a few other things Updike said. I'm thinking that I'll read something by Updike. So what are you reading this summer?

- The inner spaces that a good story lets us enter are the old apartments of religion.
- Any activity becomes creative when the doer cares about doing it right or better.
- We take our bearings, daily, from others. To be sane is, to a great extent, to be sociable.
- Golf appeals to the idiot in us and the child. Just how childlike golf players become is proven by their frequent inability to count past five.

Our Food & Faith Initiative is a group of people seeking to live out the implications of Christian discipleship in the way we purchase, grow and use food. We've been excited by the warmer weather and have been busy planting new ideas for this year's growing season. Here's some ways you can have a greener summer:



- 1. ADOPT a seedling right from church. These are plants that you can transplant into your own garden or leave in their containers and grow on a patio or back porch. Adoptions began on Sunday, May 31 and come with "papers" so you know how to take proper care of your adoptee.

Mission Of The Month For June Is SICM


