

### What Is A Kranken?



Our church currently has 20 krankenbesoekers. Twenty what? Krankenbesoekers! Krankenbesoekers are people who commit themselves to make a monthly visit to one of our shut-ins, and to also have at least one other monthly contact with that person, i.e. a phone call, card, or a bouquet of Sunday morning flowers from church. The word "krankenbesoeker" comes from the colonial Dutch churches that were established up and down the Hudson and Mohawk River valleys. It literally means "comforter of the sick." Most of these early Dutch churches had a krankenbesoeker who was often a paid person. Many Reformed churches had a krankenbesoeker before they had a pastor.

We continue that ministry of visitation today in modern times, but keep the old fashioned word. It was, and is, a noble calling. Would you like to join our church's krankenbesoekers? Let Pastors Craig or Jan Hoffman know, 370-4751.

#### Kids Hope Reports To You

On Sunday, May 22 approximately 25 Kids Hope USA mentors, prayer partners and visitors met after worship to hear answers to the question, "What's It Like To Be A Kid Today?" Here's some of what they learned:



Research has shown that what you believe about the world by the age of 13 years old is typically what you believe for the rest of your life. By age 13 a student has "aged-out" of a possible Kids Hope USA program. For that reason, Kids Hope national offered some of these statistics on the typical 13 year old today.

- •30% won't graduate from high school
- •29% live in a home without a father
- •18% are victims of reported abuse (who's to say about unreported abuse?)
- 17% live in poverty with this figure rising
- •52% admit to not attending any church

Just imagine how these statistics have influenced the lives and perspectives of our nation's 13 year olds.

Students at age 8, 9 and 10 spend 7-8 hours a day engaged in some form of media (TV, video games, computers, texting, etc.) What does this mean for today's kids? It means they are experiencing a loss of human relationship development needs. It means they are missing out on time and interaction with role models.

What can Kids Hope USA provide? It provides something novel to these children — something new and different from their everyday life. The role modeling effect of the Kids Hope USA relationship is a revelation to many of these students. The mentor is able to model new ways to relate and handle life situations in a different manner from TV and video games.

Dr. Roger Sellon of Kids Hope USA states, "Kids today are exciting, hopeful, energetic, scared and wonder sometimes who really cares?

What can Kids Hope USA provide? First Reformed Church of Scotia answers that question every time a mentor or prayer partner does something on a Sacandaga child's behalf.

An Ice Cream Social was held at Sacandaga Elementary School for our Kids Hope students, mentors, faculty and parents/guardians on Wednesday, June 1. It was the final Kids Hope USA event for the 2010-2011 school year. Now we look forward to next year!


#### Bottle Committee Sends More Checks

## **Dutch Fair Is Coming Soon**




