The Spirituality of Simplicity

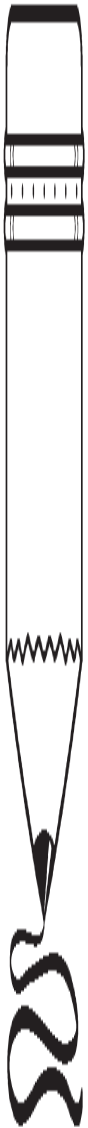
C. S Lewis, one of those voices of faith Jan and I lift up in our October preaching wrote, "Every age has its own outlook. It is especially good at seeing certain truths and especially liable to make certain mistakes. We all, therefore, need the books that will correct the characteristic mistakes of our own period. And that means the old books. All contemporary writers share to some extent the contemporary outlook – even those, like myself, who seem most opposed to it. None of us can escape this blindness, but we shall certainly increase it, and weaken our guard against it, if we read only modern writers. . . Not, of course, that there is any magic about the past. People were no cleverer then than they are now; they made as many mistakes as we. But not the same mistakes."

Some of those "old books" were written in the 16th century by John Calvin, whose 500th birthday we celebrate this year. Calvin was wrong about some things, but he saw more clearly than we do other things that are true. Lutheran theologian Kathryn Johnson identifies the following.

"Calvin is an excellent teacher when sin is wearing the face of idolatry." Calvin wrote, "The human heart is a factory of idols." He understood that what we give our heart to becomes, in fact, the object of our worship, i.e. our God, and shapes our spirituality. What does our age worship? Kathryn Johnson again: "As we reflect on the fascination with wealth that occupied so much cultural space in recent years, and as we see its enormous costs still unfolding, how can we not admire Calvin's stringent call to 'Let God alone be God' in all aspects of our lives?" How's that for a guide to the living of each day? What does God ask of me this week, this day, this hour in order to be faithful to him?

Spiritually speaking, we resist the idolatry of wealth and of things when we cultivate simplicity and focus in our living. Not that we shouldn't relish life's good pleasures. As an old Rabbi once said, "We will be judged for life's good things we refused to enjoy." But in an age that encourages excess, and in an age when the fragility and finitude of the world's resources rightly claim our attention, healthy spirituality for us and for our culture requires us to be mindful of what we use and consume. That is not something that our age yet sees or believes. But if it is true it will come to see it, for the consequences of missing it will be profound.

Today, and in all our days, let's make sure we ask ourselves this simple question: What does being faithful to God require of me this day?

Theological Center Offers Courses



The Capital Region Theological Center, sponsored by the four Formula of Agreement denominations (the Reformed Church in America, the Evangelical Lutheran Church, the Presbyterian Church USA, and the United Church of Christ) offers a number of courses this fall. - *Introduction to the New Testament.* Dr. Peter Bedford of Union College will lead this overview of the New Testament on Tuesday evenings, October 13 through December 15, from 7:00 to 9:00, at the Emmanuel-Friedens Church in Schenectady. The cost is \$225.
- *Intro to World Religions: Islam* is a unique experience to learn first hand from a faith leader, to tour a Muslim sacred space, and have to dialogue with practicing Muslims. *Intro to World Religions: Islam* will be held on Saturday, October 31, from 9:00 to 12:00 at the Islamic Center of the Capital Region in Schenectady. The cost is \$45.
- *World Religions Overview*, sponsored by the Golub Foundation. Gain an understanding of your neighbors and the world we live in with this comprehensive overview. This will be held on Saturday, October 31, from 12:30 to 5:00 at the congregation Gates of Heaven in Schenectady. The cost is \$60.

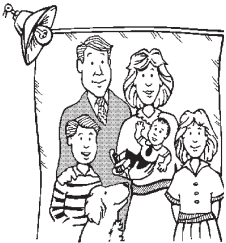

Food And Faith Hosts “Harvest Delight”

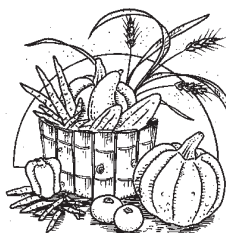

Pastor Craig Will Teach “The Essential 100”

The Essential 100 is a plan of Bible reading designed especially for people who want a broad overview of the scriptures, and who want the encouragement that comes from reading the texts and talking about their meaning with others. *The Essential 100* selects 50 lessons from the Old Testament and another 50 from the New Testament, and then bundles these lessons into groups of five – twenty groups of five in all. The essential 100 texts can thus be read over a twenty-week period.

Pastor Craig Hoffman will lead twenty weeks of *The Essential 100* this coming program year on Wednesdays starting October 7. Three sessions of *The Essential 100* will be offered each Wednesday: one from 6:30 to 7:30 in the morning, another from 12:15 to 1:15 with participants invited to bring a brown bag lunch, and another from 7:15 to 8:30 in the evening. Participants may move between sessions as their schedules require.

Earn Credits With Discipleship Project

Our Discipleship Project is one way we encourage adults to be intentional about their own spiritual growth by giving points for classes taken, books read, opportunities exercised. We are beginning the last quarter of our project to increase our adult spirituality in 2009. So far we have earned 374 credits towards our goal of 500 of the year. We encourage every adult to earn 5 credits, but you are welcome to earn more. The first 5 credits are posted on the Project board.

This fall our church is offering two opportunities to earn more credits. Sundays after worship we offer Table Talk, which earns a ½ credit per Sunday. Join Us In Working For Donuts

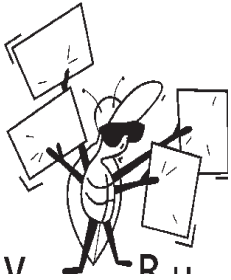

- We still need someone to volunteer on Sunday, November 1. Call Sunny Baldwin, 374-8276, if you can help.

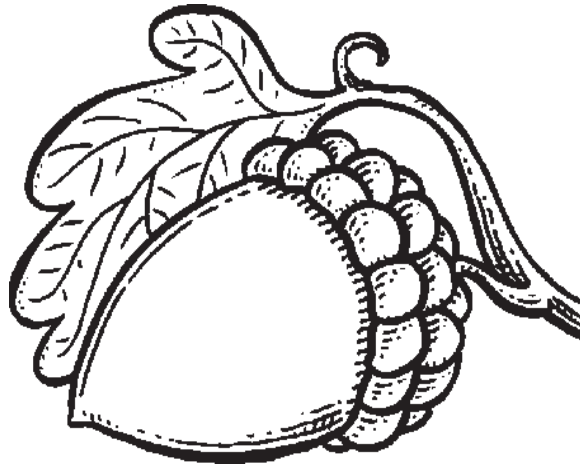
Giving Statements Are Available
