## **BRING A FRIEND. BRING A RELATIVE. BRING YOUR BOSS.**

The first church I served was a smaller, rural congregation. “Be careful what you say about folks,” one of the congregation’s sages advised me when I first arrived as a newly minted pastor fresh from theological seminary. “Most of us are related to one another.” And it was true, more or less. I quickly learned that there were extensive family ties within that congregation. There were several large, extended families, and it was fun learning all the connections. But there were even more extensive friendship ties. Most everyone who worshipped on Sunday morning was connected in one way or another to at least a few others who also warmed the pews. In a smaller church, that reality was easily seen and quickly learned.

First Reformed Church of Scotia is a larger congregation than that first one I served, and our culture is suburban, not rural. But, to a degree, the same is as true here as it was there. Many of us on Sunday morning are personally connected to others worshipping with us. Some of these ties are friendships, and we worship with people that we socialize with at other times. Some of these ties are collegial, and we worship with people we also see at work or in our neighborhoods. Some of these ties are family ties, and we come to church we see our relatives.

So it’s no surprise that when someone worships with us for the first time, they often do so because they know someone who worships here. “My friend comes here,” they tell me when I speak with them. Or they tell me that their neighbor or coworker or the parents of their child’s friend come here. Not always, but it’s way too common to be ignored.

The truth of the matter is that the best outreach, the best advertising, the best way to spread the Gospel of Christ, the best way to bless someone by introducing them to a life of worship and prayer, and the best way to grow our church is to let people know that this is your church and that you’d be glad to take them here or meet them here some Sunday morning.

That’s why our consistory has set the last Sunday of October, October 26, as our “Bring a Friend to Church” Sunday. The idea came from someone who has friends here, and family here, and at least one former colleague here.

Won’t you take up your consistory’s challenge and bring a neighbor, a friend, a coworker, or relative with you to worship on Sunday, October 26?


## Dutch Fair Results Are In



## KIDS HOPE



Why does First Reformed Church of Scotia invest in the lives of students just outside of our church walls? Why do more children in our town need this ministry of mentoring? Here are the latest startling statistics:

- 3,000,000 children in the US are abused or neglected in a single year.
- 1 in 5 children in the US suffers from at least one or more emotional, behavioral or developmental conditions.
- 66% of elementary students read below proficiency.
- 22% of students will not graduate high school on time.
- 54% of students live in a home below poverty level.

Here is the good news. According to a pre/post outcome survey on students involved with a Kids Hope USA mentor for one year:

- 65% of students improved in educational success.
- 79% of students improved in socio/emotional competency.
- 56% of students improved in attitude toward risky behavior.

The faculty of the Sacandaga Elementary School has now referred so many students to the Kids Hope program that our list of students is more than double the number of available mentors. This year a significant number of new students will be matched for mentoring. We pray for guidance to match our mentors' gifts with the children who can benefit the most.

What difference can having a labyrinth make in our church. Read this testimonial by our own Bob Atwood:

Walking the labyrinth is truly a spiritual experience. Whether alone, or in the hushed presence of others, the claptrap of everyday life falls away, and one seeks a deeper meaning to his/her existence. On your journey to the center, you may hum a hymn, say a prayer or just meditate. God, of course, is at the center, but as you work your way back to the beginning, you are not abandoning that spiritual presence but taking it away with you.

I first encountered the labyrinth at a small Episcopal church in suburban Washington, D.C., a church where parishioners were using the ingrown complex design to fulfill Lenten devotions. Intrigued, I sought its history and use today. When I walk, I feel a connection to all who have walked through the ages. It is a ritual I need to perform often; it keeps me grounded and helps me focus on what really matters.

## Consistory Election Process

We call new people to serve as elders and deacons on our consistory at our annual congregational meeting on the second Sunday in December – this year December 14. At that meeting a nominating committee presents a single slate of candidates to us for election. Additional active confessing members may be nominated at that meeting, providing that any such nominee is personally present to accept the nomination.

Our nominating committee is made up of five people: two consistory members, and three other active confessing members that our Administration Council appoints, at least one of which must not be a council member.

This year's nominating committee is made up of consistory members Mike Carpenter and Russ Garrison, Administration Council members Richard Doyle and Bobbie Nelson, and member-at-large Sue Torelli. Pastors Craig and Jan Hoffman are ex-officio members of the committee, with voice but not vote. That means that while they may suggest names for the committee to consider, they are not part of the final decision making process.

You may participate in the election process by submitting advisory nominations to the committee for consideration. Advisory nomination forms will be available at the church Sundays, October 5, 12 and 19.


