

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The Faces of Advent...and Even More!

Dear Pompton Family,

Advent began early this year--the first day of December. All of December's services are enhanced through the gifts of our Chancel Choir, and also Adult Bells or Youth Bells. You may already know these things, but just to be sure...

<u>On Sunday, December 1</u>, we lit the candle of *Hope*, and Pastor Debbie began our journey toward Bethlehem's manger, in her message highlighting the face of Mary. We celebrated Lord's Supper. Sunday afternoon was the lovely Vespers service: "Fear Ye Not," with readings, favorite carols and communion by candlelight.

On Saturday, December 7, Pompton Reformed is present to assist with the afternoon Toys for Tots Drive, and then serve hot chocolate to frozen shoppers for the evening Holiday Stroll in our town. Come visit PRC's table, as we let the community know that we are here to serve!

On Sunday, December 8 we light the candle of *Peace*. Pastor Tom's message highlights the face of Joseph. We'll also be receiving two new members into our family--Christina and Billy Scholts, and baptizing their son William. Be ready to sing, "Welcome to the Family." Following worship is our annual Congregational Meeting, for which your presence and prayers are deeply desired. Many God moments to celebrate while looking ahead to seek how the Lord is leading us.

Sunday, December 15's candle is *Joy*, and Pastor Tom's message focuses upon the faces of the angels. Healing Service.

<u>On Sunday, December 22</u> we light the candle of *Love*, and view the faces of the shepherds as they learn of the Savior's birth. Anticipation has been building toward our <u>Christmas Eve services</u>. Pastor Debbie leads the 7:30 pm worship, with plenty in store for younger children. Pastor Tom leads the 10:30 p.m. service, a more reflective service, with communion. A host of opportunities to invite and welcome any who are currently without a faith community. May their heart find a home here, centered in the love of Jesus.

OK, I admit it, I wait for "How the Grinch Stole Christmas" to come on television every year, and for the Charlie Brown Christmas special too. There have been years when for one reason or another I missed them and I have say that those years seemed a little less Christmas-y for me. Probably not something a pastor should admit, right? But you know what? The more I wonder about my seasonal television viewing habits, the more I see why these shows have become so important to me.

Both of these shows help me to understand, at least a little bit, the transcendent nature of the incarnation. They use the familiar to tell the story of a God who is beyond my understanding but who came near that I might know him. These cartoons help me in some way know the God who stepped out of eternity into the human experience so our relationship with him could be restored. This is something that is hard to wrap my human mind around, the idea that beneath all the wrapping and tinsel and Christmas cookies lies a truth, a truth that once we understand it, changes our lives for now and all of eternity. God with us back then and God with us in the here and now – Emmanuel.

God often uses the familiar to make known a truth about what God is like or what the Kingdom of God is like. Jesus did it when he told parables. He used what was around him, what people understood to make a point about things that are harder to grasp. He talked about farming to an agrarian community, he talked about rulers and masters to a people subject to the rule of others. He used the familiar things in his culture to teach truth that is eternal.

This Advent we will look at four familiar stories that are part of the Christmas narrative to find the transcendent truth that comes in a baby born in a feeding trough over 2,000 years ago. In the story of Mary, we will look for hope amid the darkness; in Joseph, we will seek peace amid chaos and uncertainty; in the angels, we will seek real and lasting joy; and in the shepherds, we will look for the Love that keeps promises and comes to those of us who are least likely to expect it.

It is my hope and prayer that as we look together at these four stories this Advent that each of us will find ourselves in these stories, that we will experience the hope, peace, joy and love that comes with knowing Jesus as Emmanuel - God with us.



May God keep our eyes open to the ways he is speaking in the familiar things around us to tell the larger story of his love and faithfulness. Yes, maybe even in cartoons.

Advent Hope



Because Health Ministry is more than physical health and embraces the truth that we must minister to body, mind, and spirit, our Advent meditation has a more spiritual focus. It is the HOPE of all of the Health Ministry team (or Cabinet) that you will find these thoughts on HOPE to be enlightening and valuable in your journey through Advent.

Hope: what is it really?

The thread that is woven through all of the Advent season is one of HOPE. The weeks of expectation are characterized by the hope that something good will come. The theme of hope is the center of many stories found in the Bible. Hope can be little more than a wish. It is used at times as if it is a fragile thing. "I hope you can come." "I hope so too, but it doesn't look promising." There was hope for the people of the Scriptures too, but it was much more robust. It's a hope worth risking for, hope that will bring change. It is hope with courage.

Tamar's story

The hope and courage of Advent is expressed well in the Old Testament story of Tamar. She is the earliest of Jesus' foremothers mentioned in Matthew's Gospel in the long lineage list found in chapter 1. Tamar's name appears in verse 3. Tamar was the daughter-in-law of Judah. He was one of the sons of Jacob (the one who prevented the other brothers from killing Joseph but instead sold him to traders who eventually brought him as a slave to Egypt). Genesis Chapter 38 tells the story of Tamar – probably not one to be used as a bedtime story for the children. The important component here is the strong hope of this woman, one that required great courage. It is a little known, but well worth the read, saga.

Scripture affirms our Hope

The thread of HOPE continues throughout the Bible. The Scriptures use the word HOPE over and over. Jeremiah writes to the people of Judah who were living in exile in Babylon. In Chapter 29, verse 11, the prophet speaks God's promise for "a future with hope." When we read these words during Advent we hear them addressed to us also. Life can contain times of captivity and exile of a form unique to each of us. The words of Jeremiah speak again, even in this time.

David writes in Psalm 65 "... O God of our salvation, who art the hope of all the ends of the Earth..." and again in Psalm 62 he says, "For God alone my soul waits in silence, for my hope is from Him." The New Testament also provides multiple references to hope. In Matthew 12:27 we read "...in His name the nations will put their hope," and Romans 15:46 speaks to the importance of God's Word "...that by the steadfastness and by the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope."

Hope as the "inseparable companion" of Faith

Calvin in his *Institutes* speaks to the connection of hope and faith. "Hope is nothing else than the expectation of those things which faith has believed to have been truly promised by God. This faith believes God to be true, hope awaits the time when this truth shall be manifested, faith believes the He is our Father, hope anticipates that He will ever show Himself to be a Father toward us; faith believes that eternal life has been given to us, hope anticipates that it will sometime be revealed; faith is the foundation on which hope rests, hope nourishes and sustains faith."

What is your Advent hope?

As you reflect on this season of hope may your personal hope be realized in the celebration of the coming of the Christ child and in seeing the wonders that show us that God is still at work in our world and in us.



PRAYER QUILT MINISTRY



It has been over a year now since we began our prayer quilt ministry. It has truly been a blessing to so many who have received the quilts; whether they were received because of a medical issue or other type of trial, or to celebrate a baptism or a life transition, such as high school graduation.

Recently it has come to our attention that some may not remember or understand the process for the distribution of these quilts. The Prayer Quilt Ministry Team as a whole does not choose the recipients. So just to review:

<u>First</u> - when you; yes, YOU, identify a person you believe would benefit from receiving a quilt, ask them if they would be open to receiving one. Perhaps you might want to ask what they would like us to pray for, and it is important that you ask what information about their situation may be shared with others. It may seem strange that someone might not want a quilt, but some might not feel comfortable being a "prayer focus" for a congregation and there is also the issue of confidentiality. A quilt was declined this past year. You may also request a quilt for yourself.

<u>Second</u> – contact Nancy Begin and request the quilt. It is helpful to provide the name *in writing* and any specific prayer request (you can contact Nancy at nbjoyful@optonlone.net). If there is one ready, it will be put out the following Sunday or as soon as one is completed.

<u>Finally</u>,- it is a gift of love and prayer that cannot be bought or sold, so we never accept any form of payment for a prayer quilt.

As a team, we have also been incredibly blessed to be part of the creation of these quilts. New members are welcome any time, no previous experience or skills needed.


CLASSIS ASSESSMENT

Legacy Garden


The Endowment Committee is proposing a long-term program directed to the beautification of the grounds surrounding the Church and the Gerrit Heemstra Memorial Building (Friendship Hall). The first phase in this program is the creation of the Legacy Garden prominently located in the roughly triangular area next to the playground and to the right of the west side entrance of the Heemstra Building. Within the Garden will be an area consisting of engraved commemorative bricks that will be surrounded by bushes, shrubs, two benches and a central tree planting. The inscriptions on these bricks may, for example, commemorate a deceased loved one, or celebrate a family or a special event such as an anniversary, wedding, birth of a child, or honor a living person. Your purchase of a commemorative brick will not only make a special remembrance for you but also will make you a participant in the creation of the Legacy Garden and in the long term improvement program of the Pompton Reformed Church grounds.
