"Every man should be born again on the first day of January. Start with a fresh page. Take up one hole more in the buckle if necessary, or let down one, according to circumstances; but on the first day of January let every man gird himself once more, with his face to the front, and take no interest in the things that were and are past." - Henry Ward Beecher

New Year's Day often brings with it a laundry list of resolutions. Things we desire to change about our lives, our habits. Some resolve to go the gym, start a new diet, quit smoking, be more organized; and on and on the list goes. It is human nature to desire good changes in our lives, to start fresh and new, and sadly, it is the human condition to have difficulty making changes that stick. Romans 12: 1-2 has a way to make changes that stick, changes that matter now and for eternity.

Here is what it says in The Message, a translation by Eugene Petersen: "So here's what I want you to do, God helping you: Take your everyday, ordinary life—your sleeping, eating, going-to-work, and walking-around life—and place it before God as an offering. Embracing what God does for you is the best thing you can do for him. Don't become so well-adjusted to your culture that you fit into it without even thinking. Instead, fix your attention on God. You'll be changed from the inside out. Readily recognize what he wants from you, and quickly respond to it. Unlike the culture around you, always dragging you down to its level of immaturity, God brings the best out of you, develops well-formed maturity in you."

This is practical advice for those of us who are seeking to follow the Way of Jesus. It is also the tough part, offering all of who we are and what we do to God as an offering. <u>All</u> - that means everything. It means the prayers we offer for others, and the public and private praise we offer to God. It also means the words we speak about others and our attitude when are in stuck in traffic and late for an appointment. I don't know about you, but for me, that is harder since my nature takes over and I often don't consider God in those situations.

They say it only takes 30 days to make a new habit, to rewire our brains in order to practice the new habit without a second thought. What would it be like if we resolved this year to live this verse from the book of Romans? The verse says God will bring out the best in us. Now that is a resolution I can live with.

• October 29, 2012 – Super-Storm Sandy devastates Ortley Beach, NJ and the Jersey shore.

• November 5, 2012 – The conversation started by a 5-year-old, that planted the seed, that started *Santa's Rooftop Response*:

"I guess he isn't coming." "Who? " "Santa." "Why? " "Because there are no roofs for him to lond on "

•November 30, 2012 - Three weeks passed since Little Man first expressed his concern about Santa not coming. For three weeks I pushed to find every child in Ortley Beach and the surrounding towns to provide him/her a Christmas gift. I found some partnerships with Toms River Schools, but what about Lavallette School and Seaside? And then the Toms River Schools reported that there were *over 700* children affected by the storm! In addition to the sheer number, we also had to match the gifts with the children's wants. After a conversation on a Wednesday that left me frustrated, followed by some quiet tears, I realized that I couldn't run this alone, I thought that I may be supported by a church, but I haven't truly accepted the support of God. After some other quiet time in a dark parking lot before yet another meeting, I was lead to my motto "Let Go, Let God."

I still had no idea if we would be able to knowingly match the donations to the children's likes, to give that magical Christmas smile that said, "There is a Santa Claus," but I had to "Let Go, Let God" and know that He will take care of it. He will make the matches that are needed; He will bring the joy to the children.

We also discovered, by the end of that week, that there were other donors supporting the Seaside Heights and Lavallette Schools. The three weeks left were focused on getting the donations to Toms River and then sorted, and planning the large Holiday Party for December 22. There was a lot I worried about, a lot of help that was still needed, but I "Let Go, Let God" and knew He will lead us to what needed to be done.

• December 22, 2012 – Santa landed at Toms River High School thanks to the MONOC EMS crew and helicopter. The joint efforts of the East Dover, Ocean Beach, Pequannock Co #2, Pompton Lakes, Riverdale and Wayne Co. #3 Fire Departments, as well as the Wayne Police Department, made for an amazing entrance for Santa into the school. The support of the personnel for the party contributed to a spectacular event for the children and their families.

The day was best summed up by a comment one of the firemen made: "I have to say that I now know how the Grinch felt when his heart grew three sizes that day. The appreciation on the residents' faces of Toms River, the hugs that we received and the tears of happiness that were shed today have filled my heart with the Christmas spirit and have left a lasting impression in my soul."

The party brought overwhelming joy to the children and their families. Before the gifts where even opened, the children and their parents had that magical Christmas smile on their faces. After the party, there were many parents that posted comments, as well as sent e-mails, with thankyous for a wonderful afternoon. Then, after Christmas morning, a few more contacted me, who said they and their children were surprised by the gifts and gift cards they were given. They said they would never forget what had been done for them.

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This does not wrap up, and end, *Santa's Rooftop Response* as easily as I had thought. I have some ongoing concerns, please remember them in prayer:

*First, for one young person who we were put in touch with; she tried to use the goodwill of *Santa's Rooftop Response* for personal gain.

*Second, for all the families who were affected by Super Storm Sandy as they work over the coming year to rebuild their homes, and their lives.

*Third, as we seek the best way to use the monetary donations that are remaining in the account. *Fourth, as we look ahead to Christmas 2013 and how *Santa's Rooftop Response* will continue its mission to provide Christmas to displaced children.

Thank you for your support of our project, as well as your prayers when we didn't even know we needed them.

Pompton Reformed Church supports **UrbanPromise** in their ministry to the children of Camden. Here is what our support has helped to make happen in 2012.

This past year—our 25th in the city of Camden—was an incredibly full and fruitful one at UrbanPromise.

Despite, or maybe because of, serving in one of the nation's poorest and most violent settings, our community has remained vibrant and creative, continually implementing innovative approaches to educating, engaging, and nurturing Camden youth. *New partnerships have been established, various service projects initiated, and programs and projects strengthened.*

At our Camden Forward School, students began learning about general and instrumental music through a partnership with Settlement Music School. UrbanPromise Academy students are participating in the school's first robotics team and taking law courses taught by Rutgers Law School. An additional 15 Street Leader teens were employed as health educators, teaching younger children about positive health practices through funding from Walmart's State Giving program. And Rebecca Bryan, MSN, CRNP launched UrbanPromise's first Wellness Center through a collaboration with First Presbyterian Church of Haddonfield.

Outside of UrbanPromise, youth and staff are giving back to others. Teens engaged in Hurricane Irene cleanup in North Carolina and staff volunteered in Tom's River, NJ to clean houses affected by Hurricane Sandy. UrbanPromise Academy students are volunteering at the Food Bank of South Jersey and cleaning a local park that was once an African American Civil War cemetery.

Because of your gifts and support, UrbanPromise is able to offer all this and more to over 600 children and teens in the city each year. *Thank you for your generosity and for investing in the lives of countless Camden youth.* Our entire community wishes you a very blessed and joyous New Year.
