

Music Program Opportunity

Your Worship Committee has been busy this summer working on a problem that affects us all as we attend worship services and other events in our sanctuary and are inspired by the music we hear there. Let me explain.

It is basic to any fine music program that the participants be talented and prepared. Equally important is the quality of the instruments which accompany them. It came to the Committee's attention in late Spring that the piano in our sanctuary was far from satisfactory and beginning to impact the quality of the music that could be presented. In fact, upon inspection by an expert piano technician, it was found to be in need of thousands of dollars in repairs. Even that expense would not solve all of its problems and it would continue to be a source of ongoing trouble. Expensive trouble!

The Committee considered a number of alternatives and after full and careful consideration determined that the only approach that made any long-term sense was to purchase a new piano. We asked our music director, June Marano-Murray, to help us locate the instrument she thought would be suitable. Working with the same expert and knowledgeable technician, a piano was located which will fully meet our needs and be an important part of our music program for many years to come.

This fine instrument has been reserved for us and now we all need to support this important effort by participating generously in the fund raising for it which will begin in mid-September. We hope to have the

cost fully covered by the end of October and to have it in our sanctuary in early November - in time for all the Christmas musical events.

This is an exciting project for our church. One that we will all take great pride in as the new piano is heard supporting our excellent soloists and choirs. It will result in musical events that would not be possible otherwise. Having a fine quality piano in our sanctuary along with one of the finest organs in Bergen County will truly enhance our already outstanding music program.


