



Did You Build a School **Supply Kit?**

Thanks to all who took part in the Operation Iraqi Children School. Supplies. These kits will be distributed to each student. Each kit contained basic, badly needed items that can make a world of difference to a child heading to school.

Assembling standardized kits ensures that each child received the same number of the most needed items, facilitates customs clearance and relieves the volunteers and soldiers of the time-consuming and labor intensive process of sorting and allocating random donated items.

Each kit was packed in a 2 gallon sized zipper seal bag. They included one pair of blunt-end scissors, one 12 inch ruler with metric markings, 12 new pencils with erasers, one small pencil sharpener, one large eraser, one box of colored pencils (crayons melt in the Iraqi summer heat), one package of notebook paper, one composition book, three folders with inside pockets and one zippered pencil bag.

Church School students also took part as part of their mission project.

RUMMAGE SALE A REAL SUCCESS






UNITED THANKSGIVING EVE SERVICE

Dedication of the Mulder Chapel at Warwick Conference Center Sunday, November 7 at 4:30 p.m.



Gently worn clothing will be accepted on Mission Sunday, November 14. A table will be ready to receive donations in the sanctuary. the most critical items are coats and pants. Larger sizes are particularly sought after, but we will be welcoming all contributions.

Warm coats. Large and extra large sizes, as even small men and women like to layer.

Rain Resistant Jackets. Hooded are especially useful.

Durable Pants. Large men sizes are preferred.

Blankets and Sleeping Bags, Sweaters, Sweatshirts and Long-Sleeve Shirts. Large and extra large. Hooded sweatshirts are especially useful.

T-shirts. Medium through extra large. Any color.

Hats and Gloves. Ski gloves or knit gloves. Knit hats.

Shoes. Sizes 9 through 12 and above. Lightly worn sneakers or athletic shoes (no spikes), soft-soled shoes and work boots.

Backpacks. Not essential, but coveted by folks on the street.

Toiletries. Travel Size.
