

PASTOR'S PEN

Beginnings are important. "Well begun is half done," the old saying goes. So how do Sunday mornings begin? For me, my Sunday morning begins with the elders. Whoever is available on Sunday morning meets with me and the other elders in my study for prayer. Regular church business is off limits. No last minute, "Can you announce this or that because so and so forgot to get it in the bulletin." No, Don't forget to make sure....." It's "what are you preaching about today?" to help them help me communicate better as far as evaluating the sermon. It's checking on the needs of the congregation as far as pastoral and care group care is concerned. And then it's time for prayer for the worship service, for the special needs we know about and for the week that is facing the church.

Then something symbolic, historic, and very Reformed happens. One elder is designated to escort me into the sanctuary. Preachers preach by permission of the elders. All preachers are sanctioned by the elders of each congregation. Guest preachers, installed preachers, all preachers preach only with the "blessing" of the elders. Elders can "close the pulpit" to a preacher. If it's the installed preacher of the congregation, who is installed by the classis, they better have a mighty good reason, but it is their responsibility to see that the Word of God is preached properly. To signify that the preacher preaches with their blessing, they escort the preacher of the day into the sanctuary thereby signaling the congregation of their permission and blessing. That is a very Reformed tradition. I'm blessed by it. and so are we at the Second REFORMED Church of Hackensack. What a great way to begin a Sunday morning!

Both Sides of the Coin

"Render therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's" (Luke 20:25).

The chief priests and scribes tried to trap Jesus. After a fulsome compliment, they asked Him, "Is it lawful for us to pay taxes to Caesar or not?" They thought they had impaled Him on the sharp horns of a dilemma. If He spoke out against paying taxes to Rome, He would be in trouble with the Roman authorities. If He affirmed paying taxes, He would raise the indignation of the strong anti-Rome movement among the Jews.

At first glance, Jesus' answer seems like He sidestepped the issue. Not so when we understand the full impact of what He meant....The implication is that Caesar and his realm belonged to God as much as any religious possession or responsibility. Actually, Jesus' answer exposes the false division between the sacred and the secular. He claimed all of life as sacred. Everything we have and are belongs to God. He cannot be excluded from any realm of life. We are responsible for everything we say, do, spend, and save. The secret of dynamic discipleship is using all things, all of life, as a sacred trust from the Lord.

This passage is an excellent basis for a fresh approach to claiming the Lord's ownership of all of life. . . . it changes everything when we render to God what is God's.... Then stewardship is a privilege. [Silent Strength, Lloyd John Ogilvie]
